Dear Families,

Welcome to Term 3.

We began the Term with a Student Free Day, allowing staff to attend our annual Staff Retreat. This year we headed to the coast and enjoyed watching the waves from the Henley Beach Surf Life Saving Club. In the very good hands of Mr Greg Hay, we explored our Dominican Heart through story, prayer, music, image, and reflection. Greg's gentle leadership allowed us time to consider our own story, connect with our community and interact with each other, all the while being present to the Dominican charism of joy, beauty, prayer, and service. The College Staff appreciated the day, and we extend our thanks to Greg Hay and Emma Rawlins (Religious Education Coordinator) for their work and preparation.

Our new staff joined our Little Doms who had their first day of school on Tuesday 23 July. Their teacher, Ms Stella Love along with the Director of the Junior School, Ms Cate O'Leary welcomed the 13 girls and their parents as they arrived with that mixture of excitement and nerves. It was a joyous morning.

Celebrating 100 days at school, the Year 2 Class invited me to visit their learning, which was all about the number 100! There was counting, measuring and writing, and grouping. How far can I get with 100 steps? Can I fit 100 objects into my locker? What shape will take 100 counters? The only thing was that I couldn't see any Year 2 students – I was greeted by 100-year-old women, dressed with pearls and sliver hair and referring to me as "Love" and "Dear".

Congratulations to the Year 11 girls on completing the Research Project. This compulsory Stage 2 SACE subject can be gruelling but is most rewarding. The skills learnt in this course certainly set students up for success in their other learning areas. The results were most pleasing with 91% of students receiving a grade within the A or B bands; success which can contribute towards their ATAR in 2023. Outstanding!

Tonight, I will be most pleased to introduce the Fete Ambassadors to the many parents who will gather for our Fete Launch in the College Hall. It is so very pleasing to have students working with parents and staff to ensure our College Fete for 2022 is exceptional. 

I didn't know if there would be



I had spoken to a friend earlier in the holidays about how much we value a good unpacking and indeed a new interpretation of a Gospel story when we attend Mass. This I got at St Peter's.

Luke 10:38-42

Jesus came to a village and a woman named Martha welcomed him into her house. She had a sister called Mary who sat at the Lord's feet and listened to him speaking. Now Martha, who was distracted with all the serving said, 'Lord, do you not care that my sister all by myself? Please tell her to help me.' But Jesus answered 'Martha, Martha', he said 'you worry and fret about so many things and yet few are needed, indeed only one. It is Mary who has chosen the better part; it is not to be taken from her.'

Fr Tom pointed out that there were over 613 laws to obey in the Jewish faith. Martha was hell-bent on carrying out the female obligation of hospitality and serving. Nothing wrong with that, but Mary was taking on the role of discipleship in being totally attentive to Jesus. Jesus is inviting them both into LOVE - not so much law.

Fr Tom used the opportunity of this story of two women to reiterate the very important role that women have in contributing to the church - something that was being debated at the Plenary Council in Sydney that very week.

On Monday the staff attended their annual Retreat facilitated by Mr Greg Hay. It was a chance for all staff to pause and consider the Dominican charism in which we work and among many of the very worthwhile activities we examined some significant scripture pieces involving women. In all of the stories we see the transfiguring acceptance of Jesus towards women in all kinds of situations.

NEWS FROM THE LEADERSHIP TEAM

DEPUTY PRINCIPAL

Welcome to Term 3. We have certainly hit the ground running. A particularly warm welcome to Ka Hei (Helen) Pham, who is new to the College and joins 10G. Helen has been in Adelaide since February, arriving from Hong Kong. She has a relative at the College in 5B and so far, is enjoying Adelaide as her new home.

It is difficult and rewarding being a parent. There is often a push and pull. In my role as Deputy Principal, I have the great privilege of meeting many parents and supporting some families in times of hardship. I would like to share some of my observations and conversations which reflect our parent community and their varied experiences, just in this last week.

LITTLE DOMS PARENTS

We were delighted to welcome our youngest students to the College this term. It is enjoyable to hear the laughter and squeals from our almost 5-year-olds. Our new and precious Little Doms girls had their very first day of school as a Transition Reception girl last Tuesday. They were welcomed by many people, namely their teacher Mrs Love.

Our nervous, proud, teary Little Doms parents have been planning for this day, for some weeks. They meticulously labelled every item of clothing, purchased the new and overpriced lunch box and drink bottle, and had the surprise in the car, ready to pass over at pick up. In the weeks leading to school, there were those reassuring conversations. At drop off, parents pointed out the toilet block yet again and reminded their daughter to drink water during the day, to have fun, and to speak up if unsure. These mums and dads exited the gates, with their final words of 'Have a great day! I love you!', all while fighting back their tears of love and pride. They now move on to the next milestones, having had their daughter successfully complete almost two weeks of school.

YEAR 7 PARENTS

Fast forward, by now our Year 7 parents have completed a few loads of washing after the Year 7 girls began Term 3 with a workshop run by Enlighten Education, before heading off to their Year Level Camp at Woodhouse Activity Centre. From a school perspective, it is excellent that we have been permitted to reinstate camps. Before the washing returned in hand with their exhausted daughter; our parents were helping pack her bags. This, all while having reassuring conversations for those girls having their very first camp experience at St Dominic's. And we can't forget navigating the Rapid Antigen Test (RAT) on the morning of camp, before bidding your daughter farewell for three days. Well done to these parents!

The stories and memories the girls have brought back with them are heartwarming (silly acts at the Talent Quest, an entertaining quiz night, getting stuck in the mud, eating treats and chatting to friends when it was lights out and bedtime hours ago). In this context of a residential camp setting, each girl is able to continue her learning; by fostering independence, strengthening existing relationships, building new friendships, and all while having a break from technology - no laptops, no TVs, no phones, and no iPads.

YEAR 12 PARENTS

Vastly different, at the very same time, last week our Year 12 parents were supporting their girls through mid-year examinations. What does this look like? This looks like consoling nerves and some tears too, delivering a steady stream of snacks to the Study (or the dining table that has been taken over), encouraging routine, and turning a blind eye to the bedroom that seems to have grown its own post code.

Whether doing the mundane tasks of washing or packing the lunchbox, relishing in moments of joy, consoling tears or simply being present, the role parents play in their children's learning and social emotional development, some would suggest is the most important relationship. Consistent experiences with family members and namely parents help the girls, regardless of their age, to learn about healthy relationships. Each girl can explore her emotions in 'predictable' interactions. Parents also act as a constant when those 'unpredictable' interactions surface. These tend to be a result of peer-to-peer interactions or factors in our external environment, which are beyond our control. Our joint role is to ensure security, safety and to provide boundaries, exposing the girls to new experiences when the time is right.

We thank parents for their continued perseverance and for trusting and working with us, whether you are supporting your daughter through; her firsts, her in -between experiences, or her lasts. It is difficult and rewarding being a parent. There is often a push and pull and we are in this together.

YEAR 1 CLASS REPORT

LEARNING ABOUT FOOD

Term 3 will engage the Year 1 girls in learning about food in a range of ways. Having a Pizza Shop in our classroom enables us to engage in learning in a range of areas including Maths, Oral Language, The Arts, Health, Italian and Technologies. The girls have enjoyed role playing in the shop and creating pizzas to serve customers, problem solving by inventing new menu items, taking orders on note pads and calculating totals for paying customers. It really has been a hive of activity to start our unit of work this term and we look forward to all the learning to come.






SOME WELLBEING TIPS FOR STAYING HEALTHY DURING WINTER

YEAR 12 COORDINATOR'S REPORT

NEWS FROM YEAR 12

August has only just begun but our Year 12 girls are on the home stretch in terms of their academic year. There are ten teaching weeks remaining for them after the current one. Whilst this end point may be a source of relief for some, others may feel a heightened sense of apprehension as final assessments approach and November SACE Examinations appear on the horizon. More than ever, this is the time for our girls to tap into their support networks, seek that extra help they need from a teacher, lean on a friend or be the one to offer support to a classmate who needs it. The cohesion and renewed sense of shared purpose developed on our **Year 12 Retreat** will hold the girls in good stead in this final part of the year.

Term 3 offers our most senior students an eclectic mix of experiences; academic fine tuning, future pathway decisions making and a **Pastoral Care Program** that aims to support the holistic wellbeing of the girls.

Week 1 saw **Mid-Year Examinations** undertaken; an important step in preparing our girls for the rigour and mental approach required to successfully complete the end of year exams. Mid-year examinations can serve to affirm a students' diligence in preparation for an exam, or act as a reminder of the need to refine exam study strategies. Increasingly, SACE examinations are moving online; so a number of staff invested time in preparing an electronic mid-year examination to replicate the SACE examination experience for their students.

NO EXAMINATION IN A YEAR 12 SUBJECT?

If a subject's assessment scheme does not include an examination, it will still have a 30% component assessed by SACE in the form of an investigation, a performance, or a folio of work. Completion of these long term tasks often takes place in Term 3 and although they test students in a different way to an exam, they are no less imposing for our girls.

FUTURE PATHWAYS

A large focus in the Pastoral Care sessions remaining this term will be guiding and assisting girls as they work their way through the process of formalising their 2023 pathway, whatever form this may take. Applications for 2023 tertiary study opened on **August 1**.

RESEARCH PROJECT REPORT

RESEARCH WITH FLYING COLOURS

The SACE Year 11 Research Project provides the opportunity for students to research a topic of choice in depth, learning vital research skills and developing personal capabilities along the way. It has been a fascinating and rewarding learning opportunity for students and teachers alike as this year the timetable was restructured to complete the Stage 2 subject in one semester, rather than across three terms. This naturally created challenges in time management and meeting deadlines, but ultimately gave students the opportunity to remain focused on their topic and has elicited some amazing individual research.

The creativity of the students, and the breadth and width of research topics chosen was truly astonishing, with many contemporary and controversial topics influencing students' choice. Students have a choice in how they present their research, with many showcasing findings in a multimodal format with creativity and flair, in addition to the more traditional style report.

SACE released the results last week which were very pleasing with all 72 students passing, and a high percentage awarded scores in the A band. Towards the end of the year Merits will be awarded and we remain hopeful that some students may also receive this acknowledgement.

I would like to thank the work of the talented and dedicated team this year with Ms Jo Riccio, Ms Fiona Greig, Ms Tina Caruso and Mr Greg Larwood supporting students so diligently ensuring the successful completion of the subject for all students.

I am a firm believer in the skills that the Research Project develops and feel confident that the Year 11 students will be well equipped to face the challenges of Year 12, and beyond.


