Introducing Gabrielle Kelly A.M.

Gabrielle Kelly A.M., daughter of Frank and Margaret Kelly (**nee TRIBE**), is the most recently honoured Old Scholar recipient of the A.M. medal for her service within the Australian community.

Enjoy reading her most-recent achievements, followed by her own

recollections of school days in the 60's and teaching at St. Dominic's

during the 70's.

Gabrielle Kelly has been working on human behaviour and systems change throughout her career, as an international film-maker, producing films on climate change for the ABC/BBC and UN; as a tech innovator and a social entrepreneur.

She was the founding Director of the SAHMRI Wellbeing and Resilience Centre in 2014-19 and Senior Vice President of the New York Health Accord (2000), before being appointed as Director of the Adelaide Thinkers in Residence program 2009-13.

This work contributed to significant systematic advances in city design, advanced manufacturing, early childhood education, ageing and psychological health in Australia.

Gabrielle was an inaugural Board Member of *Screen Australia*, Australia's film funding agency and founded the successful *Australian International Documentary Conference in 1987*.

She has her own consultancy <u>www.gabriellekelly.com.au</u> speaking and writing on *wellbeing for people and* planet and was recently Chief Advisor for Climate Action to *Green Industries South Australia*.

She is currently producing film on how South Australia became the world's leading renewable energy producer from 2001 to 2021.

Named Adelaide City, Citizen of the Year in 2020, Gabrielle has been appointed a Member of the Order of Australia (AM) 2022, a prestigious, national award recognising her work, leadership and contribution.

GABRIELLE KELLY Recollections from the 70s.

I was a teacher at St Dominic's, teaching History, French, Maths, and Drama after finishing my Arts Degree. I remember swishing up the school stairs, in full length retro, from one year 8 class to Year 11s. I was very happy. A 70s girl, in a feminist mode, I was younger than many of the other teachers, but they were generous to me. The kids were terrific, especially year 10s, for whom I was class teacher. Fifteen-year old girls had and still always have such a spark of possibility. I worked hard to interest them in learning and excite them with the promise of "full metal jacket" engagement in life. I expected a lot from them. They delivered.

Arts and Music in the DNA.

A second-generation St Dominic's girl, I knew that the arts and music were in the DNA of the school. From elocution classes in primary school, to the "everyone has a go" in the masses and assemblies, the notion of shared and sacred ritual and performance for spirituality, celebration, shared values and making meaning of life was always there. Something musical, sacred or theatrical was on offer if you were interested. I was.

The day I first sang Ave Maria in Grade 2 is still a powerful memory. Wow, I thought! What is this? Sacred music of the most complex and beautiful for 7 year olds! I adored being in the choir later, and the day we sang Hallelujah Chorus in the Town Hall had me swooning. No surprise to see the great choir still in full flight in the late 70s. Sr Jill was such a champion of ancient and evolving sacred music through the fabric of school life and learning. I loved it all.



The best of times...

My Year 8 history classes blew me away. I had found History at university and knew that the insight that comes with historical and social context and knowledge was critical to understanding world events. Still and always true. So my classes bellowed World War 1 songs and poems. We were saddened by entries in War Diaries written by teenage soldiers, as very young students learned the causes of World War 1 and 2 easily, swept along by "Pack Up Your Troubles". I also taught drama and we won the Thierry Society drama competition with our *Boyfriend* performance. The group of student performers were full of life, capacity and growth from the experience. Me too. I will never forget it.

The might of good, deep education. Learning how to write, think, add up, do history, science or technology, health and sport are what we expect of a school. Becoming "socialised" – rules, roles, sharing and consequencesalso a clear goal. The arts and music though, are the many coloured jewels in the crown that is great education, on which our democracy and evolving society sits. They offer reflection, self- awareness, spiritual insight in the private unfolding of a person, alongside the intellectual and emotional discipline of the educational journey. Every child can find a way- an extra waythrough the doors of knowledge, while bathed in story, colour and music and meaning. I am always grateful to St Dominic's for my education and the chance to play my small part in the life of the school.

And don't get me started on marching! That's for another day!!

May they rest in peace.






