Today, June 8th is World Oceans Day. This year individuals and organisations are celebrating the theme, "Healthy Oceans, Healthy Planet" with an emphasis on the prevention of plastic ocean pollution. Coincidentally there is an excellent article by Year 10 student, Nhu-Tuyet Phan, in today's Bulletin, summarising the recent talk by a passionate environmentalist, Tim Silverwood, on the impact of plastic pollution. Our front page today carries a photo of a demonstration outside Parliament House last Friday to protest the shocking disaster which has recently befallen the ocean environment along the coast of Vietnam. As you may have seen on media coverage, millions of fish have been washed up dead on the beaches, affected it is believed by the chemical waste by a plastics manufacturer and piped directly into the sea! The effects upon fishermen and the potential health threats are very real. Sadly numbers of those in Vietnam protesting against lack of Government action are likely to find themselves jailed. Not so those outside Parliament House in Adelaide.

Growth mindset: The Power of Yet

We have a small but growing revolution going in the Primary. It is called the *Power of Yet*.

It can be very frustrating for us to hear the words "I can't do it" but if we add to that statement one tiny little but powerful word – yet - and it changes the entire mindset. It can be easier and quicker for all of us to give up on difficult tasks and declare I can't do it but there is no sense of achievement in giving up. With our focus on developing a growth mindset we are communicating to our students that it's okay to find something difficult or challenging and perseverance, practice and seeking feedback will help us to improve, understand and make connections.

Research by neuroscientists has shown that when we are challenged, especially if it is something that we find interesting, then our inherent motivation rises and that the knowledge and skills are more likely to be implanted in our long-term memory of our brains. So when you hear your child talk about being deep

in the learning pit and struggling to climb out at the other side it is a good thing, they have not given up they are just not there yet.

How Did Our Lives Become so Plastic?

On Thursday the 26th of May, the Year 9 and 10s welcomed Tim Silverwood, a passionate environmentalist to talk to us about the impacts of plastic pollution and what we could do to reduce this major world problem. He is the co-founder of Take 3 (www.take3.org), a not-for-profit organisation devoted to raising awareness about the impact of plastic pollution in our oceans. "Take 3 asks everyone to simply take 3 pieces of rubbish with them when they leave the beach or anywhere and dispose of it thoughtfully."

Although Tim looked like an ordinary guy, he somehow found himself at the head of a global movement. He asked us, "Is your life too plastic?" Well, we use plastic every single day from bottled waters to plastic shopping bags. Plastic is made up of oil and several chemicals, therefore many of the plastics we use daily are non-biodegradable. But after we dispose these plastic bottles, containers and bags away in the bin, where do they all end up at? Tim showed us a video that revealed to us where and how our plastics travel from our home bins to the sea. I learnt that plastics do not break down - they break up into, gradually, smaller pieces of plastic and eventually become a source of food for the animals. The more we consume plastic, the more waste we produce. The more waste we produce, the bigger impact there is on the wildlife as they eat these subsequent micro plastics. As a result, we end up eating these animals ourselves, affecting our own health. Astonishingly, 8 million tonnes of plastic go to the sea every year from land because of us. What are those colourful-looking shells you see washed into shore at the beach? It is plastic. With all these small plastic pieces floating around, the sea became our "plastic soup".

Inspired by his enthusiasm and dedication in saving marine life from its biggest enemy, plastic, I am now motivated to reduce my plastic usage through small changes to my daily routines. Instead of plastic bags and cutleries, I am packing all my food into a container and bringing my own home cutlery set where I can wash it and reuse them again. No need for plastic bags and cutlery being wasted everyday anymore! Small changes such as putting away toothpastes, body scrubs or facial scrubs that contain plastic microbeads, or drinking from travel mugs instead of disposable coffee cups - one of the major contributions to this major global problem - can change the amount of plastic we unconsciously waste daily to recover our beautiful environment and build a healthier and more sustainable future.
