### AN OLD SCHOLAR MEMOIRE.

**3 generations of past and present St Dominic's history.** *Written by Susan O'Reilly.* 

Sue O'Reilly commenced schooling at St Dominic's as a 1<sup>st</sup> year (Year 8) student in 1964 and graduated in 1968. She then taught at the school from 1985 – 2013, a total of 28 years.

Her daughters and now granddaughter attend the school.

After collecting my granddaughter from school one afternoon, she asked:

"Nan why did you go to St Dominic's?" When I had finished answering her question, Lucy was surprised and a little bemused by the unusual set of circumstances that had led me and our family to St Dominic's.

As a seven-year-old my family was preparing to return to England after having spent the required two years here. But my younger brother became very ill. After he was discharged from hospital we moved from the migrant hostel to Salisbury North. I was enrolled at St Augustine's and so began my association with the Dominican sisters, in particular, Sr Mary Ann Holland, Sr Ruth McBride, Sr Anne Howard and Sr Mary Cahill. My brother Steve recovered fully, my sister Maureen was born and my older brother Chris and I were very settled and doing well at school.

My parents decided to remain in Australia and purchased a house at Henley Beach. This, however, meant that I had to leave St Augustine's after 3 years and complete my primary education at Star of the Sea. Then there was the question of my secondary education. My parents had decided on St Mary's in Franklin St as it was on a direct bus route for me. Then my mum "bumped into" Sr Anne Howard and Sr Mary Cahill in the city. When mum came home, she told me I was going to St Dominic's! Apparently, they had been very convincing in their argument to "let Sue come to us".

So, in 1964 I walked into St Dominic's and my first classroom was what is now the Reception classroom. In 1966 the Hill St block of classrooms was completed and the high school students moved in. I remember being particularly impressed with the large science laboratory.

I graduated in 1968 and went to the University of Adelaide and Western Teachers College.

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Fast forward to 1983. I am a wife, a mother to two daughters and a junior primary teacher on parenting leave, living at Seaford. It is the year that St Dominic's celebrated its centenary and there were many events to celebrate this. One such event was an open day at St Dom's. I took my husband and my girls to see the school that I had attended all those years ago. As we walked around the Primary school classrooms and I was sharing my memories, my 6 year old daughter, Nicole, asked if she could come to St Dominic's. My response was that perhaps one day, thinking that possibly we could manage it for high school.

Two years on and I was taking a cursory glance at the employment pages in the Saturday Advertiser. There was an advertisement for the position of Reception and Year 1 teacher at St Dominic's. I was not intending to return to work but with my family's support and encouragement, I applied for the job. When Sr Jill rang to offer me the position, I was ecstatic. Then reality set in! We couldn't commute from Seaford to North Adelaide every day. We would need to find a house and a new school for Nicole and Alison. This time it was me hearing Sr Jill say the words "let them come here".

So, in 1985 Nicole and Alison began their education at St Dominic's. Nicole graduated in 1994 and studied Occupational Therapy at UniSA. For nearly 20 years she has lived and worked across the Northern Territory. She is currently living in Darwin and is the course coordinator and senior lecturer in Occupational Therapy at Charles Darwin University. Alison graduated from St Dominic's in 1998 and studied Medicine at the University of Adelaide. She has completed her training and now works as a G.P. with a special interest in forensic medicine.

In 2012 my granddaughter Lucy was born. This time I was not leaving anything to chance! An enrolment form was completed and hand delivered to Sr Jill. In 2018 Lucy began her education at St Dominic's in the same classroom as I had, 54 years earlier. My teaching career at St Dominic's began in 1985 and continued to 2013, from blackboards and chalk to interactive whiteboards! I am immensely proud to have been a student, parent, staff member and currently, to be a part of the mentor programme in the primary school...... so very grateful for that chance meeting that my mum had with Sr Anne Howard and Sr Mary Cahill! "

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# **POETRY BOOK LAUNCH JUNE 2021**


*The Sweet Scent of Memory* is a celebration of poetry and art by St Dominic's students from 1947 – 2020. The launch of this poetry anthology was the ultimate joyous culmination of many months of compiling poems and artwork from school magazines.

On June 25<sup>th</sup>, the Sr Jillian Havey Centre was abuzz with poets, painters, music and fellowship. While guests enjoyed the delicious finger food provided, they were entertained by a melodious string quartet. Thanks to Danielle Nicholas, a wonderful PowerPoint presentation of words and images from the book played on overhead monitors throughout the night. An SA Life photographer also roamed the room taking shots for the 'Out and About' section of their magazine, as well as the Education Showcase 2021 supplement. Appearing in the August issue, the St Dominic's pages were indeed a shining light, and it was a fitting tribute to the event and St Dominic's Priory College.

Dr Helen Steele led the proceedings introducing Shelda Rathmann, the Editor, who outlined her inspiration for the anthology and the production processes. Sr Jill introduced special guest, Rachel Healy, Joint Artistic Director of the Adelaide Festival, to launch the book. Rachel's speech was insightful with wise observations about the poems, as well as memories of her own school days at St Dominic's. One of the highlights of the evening was the poetry readings by past and present students, and the vibrant voices of these poets made their poems come alive. Ayo Adejoro read her powerful piece, 'This is Us', a response to the Black Lives Matter movement. Julia Pickersgill's poem, 'The Legacy of the Watchman' and Emelia Haskey's 'Christopher' were both award winning poems in 2017 which really engaged the audience. We were also entertained by Fred Morris who played his guitar and sang 'The Rose from Stone' which he wrote in 1983. Lastly, Josie Revesz (nee Chiappin) provided much humour with her presentation of 'Alas to be a Door' which she wrote with Nina Bosco in 1978.




A new idea for raising money for sports equipment and the missions was formed this year, a gala day! Each of the teams had their own stalls and the girls donated the goods.
